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### PROJECT OVERVIEW

Durban Filmmart (DFM) is the premier annual pan-African finance and co-production market in Africa. It was created by the non-profit Durban FilmMart Institute (DFI) to support partnerships, and to further the development and production of African cinema. UNESCO named DFM 'the continent's best film market' in its 2021 Film Trends in Africa Report.

We therefore believe that it is the place to reach filmmakers, funders, distributors, broadcasters and other stakeholders from the continent and beyond with powerful climate storytelling content; and to inspire them to create and share compelling fiction and documentary films that have the potential to influence perceptions, behaviour and policy related to the climate crisis.

To this end we brought the first ever climate storytelling delegation to DFM 2024 with support from Doc Society - Climate Story Unit, STEPS, Climate Story Lab South Africa and the UCT Centre for Film and Media Studies.

DFM 2024 took place in Durban, South Africa from 19 – 22 July. The theme this year was "African Visions Unleashed: From Disruption to Accountability."

The 24-strong climate storytelling delegation came from 6 different countries, South Africa, Kenya, Zimbabwe, Namibia, Senegal and Nigeria. They included filmmakers, broadcasters, distributors, researchers, impact producers and funders.

We hosted 5 events in total: 3 climate-focussed panel discussions; an impact 'hackathon'; a distribution mapping roundtable; and a GIPA social.

"It's shocking how little attention is being given to the biggest threat humanity has ever faced, but we know as activists that this is often because people face many challenges that are more immediate to them. If we can use our artistry and our campaigns to, at the very least, keep people fully informed of what the climate emergency means to them, and at most, get people motivated to organise around climate demands, then we will see some serious movement. It's a thing that artists have done in the past, around vital social matters, we need to be doing it now, on steroids."

### **ABOUT THE CLIMATE DELEGATION**

In a major film industry collaborative effort Climate Story Lab South Africa, Doc Society – Climate Story Unit, STEPS, and the Global Impact Producers Alliance (GIPA) presented the **Climate Focus** at this year's Durban FilmMart which took place from 19 to 22 July in Durban, South Africa.

The **Climate Focus** included stimulating sessions to seek tangible approaches to communicate the climate-crisis through film with panel discussions, dialogues around potential impact strategies to effect change through film, brainstorming sessions, and networking opportunities for film industry participants creating content related to the climate crisis.

"This climate focus at DFM is part of Climate Story Unit's commitment to support transformative storytelling that advances a climate just and biodiverse future by storytellers, impact producers, and movement builders. Collectively we can envision, experiment and share how an abundant world for all could look like. ### ABOUT THE CLIMATE DELEGATION

#### **DFM African Lab Project Showcase**

We supported four documentary film projects in development to travel to DFM and take part in the **DFM African Lab Project Showcase**, a series of two hour pitching sessions spread over three mornings of the market. DFM's aim was to provide a showcase for projects in development, particularly those helmed by emerging filmmakers, who had been supported by prominent labs from or working on the content. In addition to Climate Story Lab South Africa projects, films from The East African Screen Collective (EASC), Great Lakes Creative Producers Lab, HOTDOCS Fellows, Filmmakers Collective (IBFC), and the Realness Institute were featured. Filmmakers presented their films to key financiers and festival programmers in an effort to get them on potential supporters' radar and fostering crucial connections between the filmmakers, labs, programmers and funders. DFM made sure there were high level industry representatives in the room for each pitch, including Movies That Matter, the Wickers, HotDocs and IDFA. Miki Redelinghuys and Tiny Mungwe met with the four project teams virtually before DFM and Liani Maasdorp joined them in person at DFM to prepare the filmmakers for their presentations. The quality of their presentations - which were well structured, timed, prepared and included trailers - was so good across the board that the industry representatives commented on this in the showcase and the DFM organisers after the fact.

#### Climate focussed panel discussions

Filmmakers and activists discussed the role creatives play in sounding the alarm on the climate crisis, and inspiring effective action, including the building of African climate movements, in the first of 3 panel discussions, titled **Don't Stop Talking About Climate Chaos!** Nasreen Al Amin (Climate Story Lab Lagos), Kudzayi Ngwerume (UMI Fund), Pete Murimi (BBC Africa Eye), Simeon Letoole (Human Rights Activist) and Kumi Naidoo on video (Activist and former Director of Greenpeace) featured with moderators Anita Khanna (Human Rights Media Trust/Uhuru Productions) and Emily Wanja (Doc Society - Climate Story Unit).

In the session titled **Partnerships and Pathways to Reach Audiences**, the need for collective focus and political will to effectively address climate change was unpacked and paralleled with how the HIV/AIDS crisis was handled in South Africa. Panellists James Smart (Nation Media Group), Pete Murimi (BBC Africa Eye), Noel Kok (NEWF), Nonto Sibanyoni (Sunshine Cinema), Theresa Hill (STEPS) and Cindy Makandi (Tunga Afrika) and moderator Miki Redelinghuys (Climate Story Lab ZA) addressed how the climate crisis needs a similar collective effort from all sectors including filmmakers through innovative partnerships with funders, broadcasters, and alternative distribution models, decentralised to unlock impactful audience reach.

Case studies of successful impact campaigns were discussed in the *Impact Strategy in Action* panel discussion. The aim was to share insights necessary to create effective impact strategies and inspire filmmakers and impact producers with useful models relevant to different audiences and goals. Tiny Mungwe (STEPS) moderated this session which featured Emily Wanja (Thank You For The Rain Impact Producer), Rumbi Katedza (Transactions Director) and Anita Khanna (Temperature Rising Co-Director).

#### Distribution mapping roundtable

In the *Who's Watching Our Films? Alternative Distribution Mapping* roundtable Cindy Makandi of TUNGA Afrika presented a distribution mapping initiative they have started to help film industry professionals unlock existing, new and effective distribution pathways to ensure stories reach the people they are meant for. The goal is to create an open-source model that filmmakers can use to discover viable distribution partners across the continent. The roundtable format encouraged active participation, and everyone left the room inspired and bursting with creative distribution ideas.

#### **GIPA** hackathon & social

Global Impact Producers Alliance coordinator Miriam Ayoo called on impact producers and the audience in the room to devise the foundation for an impact strategy in 45 minutes during the *Impact Hackathon*. Femi Odugbemi, producer of the feature film The Man Died (2024), which is based on Wole Soyinka's prison memoir, showed the film's trailer and spoke about his vision of using the film to mobilise audience to resist oppression and promote democratic values. Miriam then lead the panel - Emily Wanja (Doc Society), Nasreen Al Amin (Climate Story Lab Lagos), Tiny Mungwe (STEPS) and Liani Maasdorp (Climate Story Lab ZA) - and audience through a high-energy, interactive session that elevate the impact potential of the film.

### **REACH**

### REACH

#### **NETWORK BUILDING**

DFM 2024 offered an incredible opportunity for creatives, funders, and other stakeholders from across the continent who work on the climate issue to spend time with each other, learn more about each other's work and strengthen the pan-African climate storytelling and impact distribution network.

This delegation also gave CSLZA the opportunity to add two projects that are part of the STEPS Generation Africa slate of climate-centred films - *Bargny* (Senegal) and *For Those Who Will Inherit The Earth* (Namibia) - to our 'family'; and through collaborating on this it strengthen our bonds with STEPS.

The DFM African Lab Project Showcase introduced us to further climate-focussed projects from the rest of the continent, showed us how many filmmakers are dedicating their time and energy into climate storytelling, and introduced those projects to Kudzayi Ngwerume, who joined our delegation to represent UMI Fund at the event.

During a post event debrief with the DFM organisers the mutual benefit of seeing the work other labs on the continent are doing to develop and support emerging filmmakers was discussed, and it was pointed out how much a project can benefit from support from more than one lab, since different labs support filmmakers at different stages of filmmaking. STEPS Generation Africa and the Great Lakes Creative Producers' Lab support content production, Rough Cut Lab Africa helps filmmakers polish their films in post-production, and Climate Story Lab ZA helps filmmakers develop impact distribution strategies for example. DFM director, Magdealen Reddy, offered to bring representatives from the labs together virtually for a few engagements before DFM 2025 so that we can strengthen connections made at DFM 2024, share resources and keep abreast of each other's work and the projects we are supporting. Establishing a network of pan-African film labs that will hopefully engage regularly and meaningfully with each other is an incredible, unanticipated outcome of our participation. It has been proposed that the next in-person meeting of pan-African film labs is held at Fespaco in February 2025.

#### **BENEFIT TO FILM PROJECTS**

Project creatives got the opportunity to pitch to decision makers from festivals (incl IDFA, HotDocs and Movies That Matter) and funders (including UMI Fund and The Wickers) and meet with potential partners and supporters following their pitches. Every project secured at least one (I actually think they each had min 2) meeting including (let's ask the projects who they met with and what their key take-aways are).













# THE CLIMATE FOCUS AT DFM: LOOKING AHEAD

During a debrief between the DFM and CSL teams on 21 August 2024 the DFM director extended an invitation to continue the climate focus at DFM long term. The DFM team expressed that the climate panel discussions and other sessions hosted by this delegation added immense value to DFM 2024, and that it filled a gap they had been concerned about for a number of years. They commented on the overall quality of our sessions, and how well-prepared our projects' African Lab Showcase presentations were. We were asked for our input on how to improve the African Labs Showcase, and for how to expand and strengthen the climate focus at DFM going forward.

The DFM 2024 climate delegation organising team would like to take a delegation to DFM again in 2025. We believe this market is a fertile space to bring filmmakers, distributors, festivals, markets, broadcasters and streamers from the continent together, and to expose our filmmakers and their projects to stakeholders from the rest of the world.

We believe that it is critical to continue the climate conversation in markets like this on a regular, ongoing basis. Since we are valued at DFM and they are prepared to give us a substantial platform to keep climate on filmmakers and distributors' agendas, we motivate for continuing and even expanding our collaboration with them.

For 2025 we'd like to host a 2 day lab with climate filmmakers before the market starts; to again offer a number of panel discussions on a selection of well curated climate topics; and take a bigger part in the African Lab Showcase. The hackathon was a very popular session, and we could experiment with this model further next year, perhaps hacking more than one of the African Lab Showcase climate projects in a slightly longer session. We'd also like to find ways to be more inclusive of Climate focussed organisations and activists who could offer partnerships and support to Climate focussed creative projects. We recognise that in pursuing impact, it;'s not just funding but strategic partnerships that can bring value to a project. Miki Redelinghuys therefore proposed to the DFM organisers that they make day passes available for free to climate activists and representatives of organisations that could partner with climate film projects.

### Durban Filmmart 19th - 22nd July 2024 Climate Storytelling: The crisis and the opportunity

Reflecting on **Ben Okri's article Artists must confront the climate crisis – we must write as if these are the last days** – The Guardian.

Members of the public are worried.

The world's largest ever survey on the public opinion on climate change by UNDP shows 65% of the people believe that climate change is a global emergency and the majority are calling for a wide range of action from their governments.

Our communities are experiencing first hand, the existential crisis that is climate change. We know it, through droughts, floods, cyclones, hunger, loss of livelihoods and culture. Governments are stretched to capacity by post pandemic economic stressors, rising external debt, political upheavals and a global social economic system that's struggling to adapt to the complexity of the crisis. As a confluence of challenges unfold, Africa is continually portrayed as a victim. We know these types of narratives too well. They do not define who we are.

So what are the stories we must tell to meet this moment? Where must these stories be seen and experienced to shift the narrative? What is our vision of a climate just future? Collectively our work shapes imagination and influences culture. As custodians of public interest media at varying levels, are we doing enough in our storytelling and programming to reflect the struggle, hopes and aspirations of our communities grappling with this crisis?

We have curated four sessions that will unpack climate narratives production, programming and unconventional routes to audiences.








## 2024 AFRICA LABS SHOWCASE

By featuring these projects, the Durban FilmMart not only highlights the diverse storytelling and creative prowess of African filmmakers but also reinforces its role as a key platform for nurturing and elevating African cinematic voices on the global stage.





#### **IMVULA**

On the 22nd of April 2022, Nomandla Ngakula received a WhatsApp message from her community group that read, "Don't go to sleep. The river is rising. There's more rain on the way. Be ready to evacuate." She was at her home in Quarry Road, situated on the banks of the Palmiet River in Durban. Nomandla, an environmental activist, had partnered with UKZN's School of Environmental and Development Studies to develop early weather warnings. After the floods, as the community rebuilds, this partnership continues. Nomandla is also collaborating with the Centre for Environmental Rights, embarking on a journey to hold accountable those responsible for carbon emissions contributing to the climate crisis.

The 2022 floods are considered the most catastrophic natural disaster yet recorded in KwaZulu-Natal. Nomandla lost everything

during these floods and is now rebuilding her life, believing that resilience is the ability to bounce back. For Nomandla, rebuilding means incorporating climate adaptation as the crisis continues to bear its ugly fruits. She is interested in teaming up with relevant stakeholders to ensure this happens.

The School of Built Environment and Development Studies at the University of KwaZulu-Natal is led by Cathy Sutherland, who works with communities in Quarry Road, Durban, to co-produce knowledge and create climate adaptation strategies. Nomandla worked closely with Prof. Sutherland to develop weather warnings for the community, which led to the timely evacuation during the 2022 floods. Although she lost her property, she was able to evacuate in time with her son.

#### DIRECTOR/PRODUCER STATEMENT

The floods of April 2022 affected many people in Durban, and as a filmmaker from this area, I feel a need to tell these stories as we are still grappling with the climate crisis. Nomamndla and her community help tell the story of resilience as she addresses the issues they face while taking care of her son.

#### DIRECTOR/PRODUCER PROFILE

Kethiwe Ngcobo works at the intersection of broadcasting, film and TV production, story development (feature films, TV series, and documentaries), and audio-visual education. She is the founder of Fuzebox Entertainment. She has produced seven drama series, directed and produced six documentaries, and directed a feature documentary. She has also produced another feature documentary and five feature films. Currently, she is focused on developing a slate of feature adaptations. In addition, she serves as a guest lecturer and mentor for various institutions globally and locally.

Omelga Mthiyane has directed and produced several documentary films for the South African Broadcasting Corporation (SABC), ETV, BBC World, and Al Jazeera.

#### TO THOSE WHO WILL INHERIT THE EARTH

Ina-Maria Shikongo is a Black Namibian female activist and artist who has emerged as a prominent voice in the fight for climate justice and social equity. Born in 1979 in Kalulu, Angola, Ina-Maria's early years were marked by displacement and adversity, as her family actively fought apartheid in Namibia and had to seek refuge. She embodied the spirit of activism from a young age, driven by a deep-seated desire to fight against injustices and advocate for change. Today, Ina-Maria dedicates her life to challenging the exploitation of land and resources by multinational corporations in her home, Namibia. Through her artistry and activism, she amplifies the voices of marginalised communities and tirelessly advocates for a more equitable and sustainable future. Ina-Maria's activism extends beyond local initiatives, as she is actively involved in international climate movements such as Fridays For Future.

The film follows the turbulent life of 42-year-old Ina-Maria, known prominently for fighting against the Namibian government and multinational mining companies to protect the Okavango World Heritage site from fracking. We experience Ina-Maria's life as she navigates threats to her security, food and money shortages, and mental instability. As she balances activism and strives for mental and physical wellness, Ina-Maria embarks on a new project to curate mural art with indigenous women in the Okavango Delta. Through her activism, the film exposes the intricate web of power, capitalism, and exploitation, ultimately questioning the sacrifices Ina-Maria has made as an activist and the value of her struggle. The central conflict revolves around the tension between her desire to protect the environment and her commitment to her family's safety and mental and physical wellbeing in a relatively wealthy country with great disparity along racial lines.

#### **DIRECTOR/PRODUCER STATEMENT**

This documentary's essence lies in the profound bond with the community we are portraying, centred around Ina-Maria Shikongo and the impact of her activism on her personal life and mental health. Observing Ina-Maria's painful personal journey and the evolution of her advocacy has deeply moved me as a filmmaker; this film is a testament to her inspiring activism.

#### THE CONSERVATIONIST

The Conservationist is a feature-length documentary that tells the story of Moreangels Mbizah, a Zimbabwean conservationist who is working to restore the balance between rural communities and nature, so people and wildlife can coexist regardless of farmland development and wilderness areas that need to be preserved. As she works to increase food sustainability within communities, the ever-looming threat of mining companies is growing.

Moreangels is determined to restore the balance between rural communities and nature by promoting coexistence between humans and wildlife, so farmers can thrive and lions and other wildlife can be protected. However, with human-wildlife interactions on the increase as animals enter villages in search of food and water, retaliatory killings are on the rise. During a year with one of the worst droughts on record, she has to continue to innovate to find new ways to protect the environment.

Told through poetic narration by Moreangels, the film relates a story of a love for a very complicated country that is beautiful on the one hand, but fraught with corruption, economic challenges, and hyperinflation on the other.

#### **DIRECTOR/PRODUCER STATEMENT**

I want to tell this story of innovation in adversity with the beauty and dignity it deserves. It is the story of a complicated love between Moreangels, the communities she works with, the wildlife she protects, and the son she is raising, in the country she is battling to preserve while under threat from climate change and encroachment by corporate entities.

Rumbi Katedza is a Harare-based filmmaker and writer who produces independent fiction and documentary content through her production company, Mai Jai Films. Her recent documentary *Transactions* won Best Zimbabwean Documentary at the Zimbabwe International Film Festival, was Runner-Up in the Best African Documentary section at Encounters International Documentary Festival, and was nominated for the German Grimme Prize and for Best Documentary at the African Movie Academy Awards.

#### BARGNY

Bargny is located some thirty kilometres from Dakar. Situated on the edge of the ocean, it has a population of around 70,000. Fishing is the main activity for men, while women are involved in the processing of fish products. For some years now, Bargny has been suffering from the fury of the Atlantic Ocean's waves. Periodically, houses are destroyed, cemeteries submerged, and populations are forced to move. Wedged between the sea and the main road, the commune has lived with pollution since the Sococim cement plant was installed in 1948. Over the last few decades, pollution problems linked to the installation of this plant have exploded. and residents are constantly calling for measures to be taken.

Since then, new threats have been added to the people's ordeal. The coal-fired power plant, built by the Senegalese government with financing from a West African bank, didn't last long. After just a few years in operation, it is destined to be shut down as a result of the

actions taken by the people, in particular, the complaint lodged against BOAD. This bank, after declaring the complaint admissible, dispatched investigators to take a look at the situation and draw the consequences. This victory for the people against the state and private investors strengthened the commitment of the associations. Today, other threats hang over Bargny, including the mineral port and the steel plant.

Cheikh Fadel Wade has distinguished himself in the fight against the plant. He was at the forefront of the fight, and today is one of the leading figures in environmental activism. He will be the main character in the film. Climate change is a reality that the African continent is experiencing head-on. And according to some studies, Bargny is particularly threatened. In this small commune on the outskirts of Dakar, Cheikh Fadel fights daily to halt the peril threatening his neighbourhood.

#### DIRECTOR/PRODUCER STATEMENT

Bargny is a commune on the outskirts of Dakar, just 30 kilometres from the Senegalese capital, on the shores of the Atlantic Ocean. Seventy thousand souls live in this land of fishermen, market gardeners, and others, in a city lifestyle with a social organisation of neighbourhoods that were villages not so long ago.

#### DIRECTOR/PRODUCER PROFILE

Mame Woury Thioubou began her career in 2009. Eager to reflect the struggles of Senegalese society, she embarked on the production of her first medium-length film, Agora Braille, about the inclusion of the visually impaired in the school system.

Mamadou Hady Dia is a young Senegalese producer. With six years of experience as a general manager and production manager in the film industry, he joined Karoninka as a producer in 2020. In 2022, he set up his own production company, Malaka Studiolab, based in Senegal.

This careless disregard of the desperate housing needs of Capetonians gave birth to a social justice movement, "Reclaim the City". #### The Battle of Laikipia

For centuries, Kenya's Laikipia region has been a grazing route for Indigenous pastoralist communities. It is also home to white ranchers and conservationists who settled during the British colonial era and stayed after Kenya's independence in 1963. The pastoralists, the ranchers, and conservancies all rely on Laikipia's grasslands to sustain their cattle and the wildlife. Since 2017, they have been filmed as they confront the ravaging effects of climate change. When drought and elections collide, conflict erupts. The filmmakers explore identity, the complicated legacy of British colonialism, and the intersection with climate change at the planet's most fragile moment
